## **1. THE UNIVERSITY OF HAMBURG**

The University of Hamburg is one of the younger German Universities. It was officially founded in the year 1919. But in the 17. century its roots already began to grow. In 1613 the „Akademische Gymnasium“ (academic high school) was founded. After a short schooling period the students could attend the „Gymnasium“ in order to obtain further basic knowledge for future specified studies. Unfortunately the „Gymnasium“ had to be closed in 1883 due to a shortage of students. The poet Heinrich Heine commented this situation by saying: „In Hamburg it isn't the disgraceful Macbeth who reigns, it is exclusively Banco!“

In deed there were a lot of salesmen in the hanseatic city of Hamburg with its trading tradition. So the focus was mainly on trading and commerce - not in science and education.

Nevertheless it was the salesman Edmund Siemers, who funded 1911 the main building. It was used for general lectures and also for the education of specific professions. Along with this development a lot of other scientific Institutions were founded, so that the main part of an academic education was guaranteed. At the beginning of the 20. century the senator and future mayor Werner von Melle declared that the unification of all these institutions to one big institution is one of his goals. But in parliament, that was elected by a „Klassenwahlrecht“-system, he failed to get the necessary majority and the plans of von Melle could not be realized. Those who voted against the plans were mainly the politicians who had a picture of Hamburg as traditional trading city with no need of investment in science and were afraid of the claims of the professors. But after the First World War the development and the pace of science was unstoppable, so that in 1919 the founding of the university could be celebrated.

Today after plenty of reforms the University of Hamburg has 43.000 students - 2200 among them are foreign students - the third biggest University of Germany. From the end of the Fifties until the mid of the Sixties the enlargement of the campus in the „Von-Melle-Park“ next to the „Außenalster“ took place. But even this bigger campus couldn't provide enough space, so that only just some years after the enlargement a lot of new faculties were spreading all over the city. The faculty of law and its lectures are mainly on the main campus in the „Von-Melle-Park“.

In 1994 another salesman, Dr. Wilhelm Greve, donated some million Euro to the University. So the University was able to build two new modern wings to the main building of the University at the „Edmund-Siemers-Allee“.

## **2. THE FACULTY OF LAW**

The faculty of law has about 5000 students and 50 regular professors. In addition to that there are a lot more „special“ professors, assistant professors, assistants and other teachers and scientists.

Prior to 1998 there were two faculties of law, but nowadays these faculties are unified to one big institution. Within the faculty the Erasmus-Students are free to choose any lecture that is provided. For further information:

### **4. SELECTION OF LECTURES AND COURSES**

The German college study system demands a high degree of individual responsibility and independence of its students. The Erasmus Students are completely free in their choice of lectures and courses. Normally you can even attend lectures from other faculties. For most lectures the University offers connected courses (working groups: AG) with smaller groups, where the content of the lectures will be repeated by solving cases. The teaching persons of these courses aren't professors but assistants, lawyers or law. For the lectures you usually don't have to apply, but for the courses an online application is required.

At your arrival you will get an account for the intranet system of the university and you will be informed how to apply for courses. Concerning the lectures there won't be any check of attendance, while in the courses the attendance is checked.

All of the lectures and courses the dates and places are announced a few weeks prior to the day of the first lecture in the „Semesterprogramm“. Since for the German students most of the lectures are part of an obligatory lecture program, the old Semesterprogramm of the last semesters will give you a

good picture of what is going to be provided in the upcoming semester. Especially in the part of the „Pflichtvorlesungen“ there won't be big changes.

If you want to improve your language skills in other languages than German (English, Spanish, Italian, French etc.) you can apply for these courses that are provided by the foreign language center of the University Hamburg. But before you apply you need to pass an entry-level-test. These tests usually take place in the first week of the lectures and the courses start in the second week. As an exception for Erasmus Students the tests can also be taken on the first day of the course. For further information check out the language center (Fachsprachenzentrum) in the „Wiwi-Bunker“, Von-Melle-Park 5. The head of the center is Lydie Batigne.

## 5. Exams

The University of Hamburg does not demand any passed exam from the Erasmus Students.

So you only have to check what is required by your home university. From our point of view it is advisable to write three to four exams every semester. You can choose among all the lectures, such as international law ( e.g. Internationales Privatrecht, Int. Handelsrecht, Europarecht), lectures out of the „Wahlschwerpunktsthemen“ where you focus on specific law subjects (there are 18 of these subjects for students of higher semesters) and among the basic German law lectures.

The Erasmus Students can also do their exams orally. The content, topic and date have to be **decided individually with your examiner**. The examiner should usually be the person who is holding the lecture you want to be examined in.

Prior to the exam you will get a form from the Erasmus office, which you have to hand out to the examiner who will fill it out and sign it. Once you've passed the exam **you need to give these forms back to Martina Lasczewski, Schlüterstraße 28, Office nr. 206.**

As a proof of your passed exam you will receive an **Erasmus-Certificate**.

But you can also write the normal exams and papers, which the German students have to write.

But we advise you **NOT** to take these written exams, since they require a lot of formalities that are not really necessary for international students to learn. Instead you should focus on the oral exams.



For advanced students there are also special courses, in which the students can deepen your knowledge in certain specific law questions. In these Seminars you need to write a paper of approx. 25 pages, which you have to explain orally in front of the class. It is necessary to apply in advance for the seminar you wish to take part. If your written paper and explanation is accepted and passed you will receive a certificate.

## **6. ECTS-POINTS**

Overview of the ECTS System:

European Credit Transfer and Accumulation System (ECTS) is a standard for comparing the study attainment and performance of students in the higher education system across the European Union. For successfully completed studies, a certain amount of ECTS credits are awarded. One academic year corresponds to 60 ECTS-credits that are equivalent to 1500-1800 hours of study in all countries irrespective of standard or qualification type and is used to facilitate transfer and comparability throughout the Union.

You can obtain credit points by hearing lectures and writing exams. Here is a list of the credits awarded at the Faculty of Law of University of Hamburg:

In order to achieve the amount of 30 credits points per semester, for instance a student has to attend 5 lectures (2 SWS) and pass the oral exams.



\*SWS (*Semesterwochenstunden*) means hours of lecture a week.

Further more the German law school grading system is different to the ECTS System. In the German law study system you get points from 0 to 18, where 18 is the best mark you can get.

The professors will grade you according to the German system. But at the end of your semester you will receive a special certificate from the Erasmus office which will certify the conversion.

## 7. LANGUAGE COURSES

For Erasmus Students the University of Hamburg provides free German Language Courses. The teachers are academically qualified persons and the courses also offer you the possibility to obtain ECTS credit points. If you wish to take part in these courses you need to take a special test before the beginning of the semester, because the courses are divided into beginners and advanced. But even for the beginner courses a basic knowledge of the German language is required. The courses will take place twice a week (90 min each) during the semester. The goal is to improve the lexical and grammar knowledge of the students. Each participant needs to give a presentation and write papers.



## **8. ACCOMODATION**

The University of Hamburg tries to provide a place in a students residence hall for every foreign student. You will find an **application form** for these students residence halls on our website.

The sizes of the rooms in the student accommodations are between 10 - 15 square meters and they are fully furnished. The bathrooms and the kitchens are shared with other students. There are also additional features in certain student accommodations. The rent for the student accommodation is 190 EUR per month. Most of the student residence halls do also provide an internet connection.

However due to a lack of capacity it is unfortunately not always possible to offer students accommodations to all foreign students. If you have been rejected you will be put on waiting list and will be informed shortly before the beginning or at the beginning of the semester whether there are rooms available. Anyway in the case of a rejection of your application you should consider to look for private accommodation, in order to make sure that you've got a place to stay.

### **Unfortunately we can't help you with the search of a private accommodation!**

The cheapest option for private accommodation is to look for flat shares. But even in an apartment that you share with other students you have to pay rents between 250 EUR and 350EUR a month.

Otherwise you can search for an own flat to rent in Hamburg. In this case the rents vary from 280 EUR to 450 EUR per month.

For the period that you are searching an accommodation in Hamburg you can either book a youth hostel or ask at the students residence halls (for instance: Paul-Sudeck-Haus and Europahaus) for a guest room. Before the beginning of the semester you can usually book a cheap and clean guest room for the purpose of your search.

## **9. HEALTH INSURANCE**

Every Erasmus Student has to have a **proof of health insurance in order to enroll at the University of Hamburg**. There are two options to obtain such a certificate:

1. You go with the form **Modell E 111/E 128** (European recognition form for the health insurance of your home country) from your own Health insurance to any health insurance company in Hamburg. For instance: Techniker Krankenkasse on the campus (Schlüterstraße) or:
2. You get a certificate of your insurance that certifies that you have a health insurance during your period of study in Hamburg.

Important: You have to **bring this proof along to the Studentensekretariat at the time of enrollment**. Usually the certificate consist out of **two copies**, you need to bring them both.

### What to do in case of illness and when a doctor is needed?

1. In case of normal illness you can consult a pharmacy for any pharmaceuticals that don't need a prescription such as cough syrup and nose drops. These pharmaceuticals are not going to be paid by your insurance – you have to pay them by yourself.
2. In case of serious illness you have to go to a general doctor (general practitioner). For this purpose you need to have chipcard of your insurance (or from a German insurance – the first way, see above). Further more you have to pay a charge ro the doctor you first visit (10 Euro). For your next visit in the same quarter (3 month period) you don't have to pay the fee – for the first visit in the next quarter you have to pay the fee again. Be advised, that you have to go to the same doctor in the quarter. If you go to a different one you have to pay the fee again – even in the same quarter. If the doctor decides that you have to go to a specialized doctor he will give you a form that will waive the fee at specialized doctor.

### Different kind of doctors

Once you've obtained the chipcard of your insurance you can go to all the public doctors of all fields (the vast majority cooperate with the insurances), they are called „**Kassenärzte**“. You will find the addresses of doctors you are looking for in the „Gelben Seiten“ (yellow pages). When you call them always



make sure that they are cooperating with your insurance. If they don't your insurance will **NOT** pay for it. It is always **required to bring your chipcard**.

#### An exception: the dentist

When you go to the dentist you also need your chipcard. But you also have to make sure what kind of treatments are covered by your insurance, because most of the dentists work will not be paid by your insurance and they will charge you the 10 Euro fee again even though you already paid the fee to a different doctor this quarter.

#### Pharmaceuticals:

If for the treatment of your illness pharmaceuticals are needed, the doctor will hand you out a prescription („Rezept“). With this prescription you have to go to the pharmacy where you usually have to pay a prescription fee of about 5 EUR. Sometimes not the total cost of prescribed medicine is covered by your insurance. Important: Some pharmaceuticals, such as antibiotics, are only sold with a valid prescription. Therefore you definitely need to see a doctor in case of serious illness.

## **10. THE ENROLMENT**

If there is a contract of an Erasmus-Partnership between the Faculty of Law of the University of Hamburg and the faculty abroad, the application needs to be presented to the hometown university first. Once the student is accepted by his home university, he has to fill in the online application forms and send them to the Faculty of Law.

To make the application process as easy as possible we have introduced an **online registration** system. Please note that online registration is an **obligatory process**. Please note that **any student who does not apply online cannot be admitted to the University of Hamburg**.

### **Online Registration deadlines**

- a) 01.06.-15.10. - for Winter Semester and whole academic year
- b) 01.12.-15.04. - for Summer Semester 2010

**Students will not be allowed to register after the deadlines mentioned.**

After this procedure the students are preliminary enrolled at the University of Hamburg. On arriving in Hamburg the Erasmus Student will receive a students identification card and a preliminary and temporary (for four weeks) semester ticket. In order to complete the enrollment at the University of Hamburg all Erasmus Students have to pay the semester contribution of about € 200. Once this amount has been paid, the students receive their final student identification card and semester ticket. The semester ticket entitles you to use the Hamburg Transport System (HVV), including all buses, underground railways and rapid transit railways within Hamburg.

## **11. THE REGISTRATION**

Beside the enrolment at the university you also have to be registered at the registration offices of the State of Hamburg. This is the law! Normally you can go to any district office (“Bezirksamt” or “Bürgerbüro”) of the city-government Hamburg. For example those, who stay in the students residence halls „Europa-Haus“ and „Paul-Sudeck-Haus“ can go to their district office in the Kümmellstraße 7. For other district offices check:

Required documents:

- 1. Rental Agreement**
- 2. Certification of your Landlord (that you moved in)**
- 3. ID-Card or Passport**

At the registration office you will have to fill out a form that will be given to you. Afterwards you will receive **an affirmation of registration** (Meldebestätigung). It is important to keep this affirmation, since it is required in order to obtain the chipcard for the library, open a bank account, get a Internet access login at the University computer center etc.

## **12. TRANSPORT SYSTEM**

Since 1994 the semester fee includes the „**Semesterticket**“. As already mentioned this ticket permits the transport in **buses, night-buses, trains and**



**metros** within the region of Hamburg. So you don't have to buy any transport ticket, once you've got the Semesterticket!

Only the express buses charge you an extra fee.

The Semesterticket is only valid in connection with your ID-Card or passport, so you always have to carry both with you. With exception of the hours between 6 to 9 am and 4 to 6 pm you are also allowed to bring your bike into the trains and metros.

Since Hamburg is a bicycle friendly city, we advise you to bring or buy a bike. On thursdays and fridays the „AVIS“ is published. This is a journal with classifieds for bikes and a lot of other stuff. Further more there are also auctions for bikes in the lost-property-offices.

### **13. BANK ACCOUNT**

Every student can easily open a bank account. Almost all the banks provide free bank accounts to students. Concerning the cash machines (ATMs, „Geldautomaten“), the banks are divided into the cash-group banks, the cash-pool banks and the Sparkassen. So if you don't want to pay extra charges at cash machines you should stick to those ones, your bank is belonging to – e.g. if you have an account at the Hamburger Sparkasse you can get cash free of charge at every Sparkasse in Germany, if you have an account at the Postbank you can get cash free of charge at every Deutsche Bank, Dresdner Bank, Commerzbank or Postbank cash machine.

In Germany it is pretty important to have a bank account since all the wages and rents are usually transferred from bank account to bank account. You will not be paid in cash and you normally can not pay your rent cash! Most banks charge you extra fees for transfers from foreign countries – ask them for reduced fees for European Union transfers.

If you don't want to open a bank account, you can also ask a bank to transfer your cash to the landlords account, but this carries always a fee.

Required documents for a bank account:

- 1. ID-Card or Passport**
- 2. Affirmation of Registration (Meldebestätigung)**
- 3. Students ID**

Normally the banks do not distribute Eurocheques and EC-Cards to Erasmus Students that stay only for a short period of time.

The University of Hamburg has about 14 Cafeterias. 3 of them (Main Cafeteria, Campusmensa, Philosophenturm) are directly on the campus, i.e. in walking distance to the faculty of law. The Cafeterias offer breakfast, lunch and dinner (dinner only in the Philosophenturm). Beside a permanent salad and pasta bar the meals differ from day to day, while there are always also vegetarian offers. The price for a meal is 1.00 EUR to 3.50 EUR. You don't need any Cafeteria card – you pay cash, they just might ask you for your students ID.

## **15. LIBRARY**

As an Erasmus Student you are entitled to enter all libraries. At the majority of the libraries you can't borrow any books - you can just read or make copies for 0,05 EUR in the library. In the main library of State of Hamburg („Staatsbibliothek“) on the campus there is a special section of books that can also be rented by students.
